LONG-TIME STONEWALL RESIDENTS CELEBRATION

Have you lived in Stonewall for 45 years or more? The Stonewall Community Association wants to honor you on Sunday September 18 from 2 to 4 p.m. at the Stonewall Elementary School. Past President Leah Atkinson-Brand and her committee have been coordinating this event to recognize 45-year residents. In June we mailed a letter and questionnaire to eligible residents we had tentatively identified. If you did not received our letter and you feel that you have lived in Stonewall long enough to qualify, please contact Leah at maryleah09@gmail.com or 223-7304 as soon as possible.

Because of budget constraints, attendance at the event will be limited to the persons who have 45 years or more residence here and their children who were raised in Stonewall. There will be a recognition ceremony with cake and refreshments. A commemorative list of long-time residents will be included with the event program. The cafeteria will be decorated with photos, maps, and newspaper articles about the evolution of Stonewall as a community. As well there will be speakers telling about the early development of Stonewall and memories of the early years. This will be a once-in-a-lifetime event. Don't miss it!

Getting long-time residents together is a first step in trying to develop a history of Stonewall. Although this event is for 45-year-or-more residents only, we need *all* long-time residents' stories as well as photos or newspaper articles that would be useful in creating a Stonewall history. Please plan to send anything of interest along these lines to Leah. And if you want to work with her on this event, she would love to have volunteers to work on reconstructing our neighborhood's history from that first settlement in the late 1950s to the present.

DELORES TAORMINA MEMORIAL DEDICATION SEPT. 20

Please join us to dedicate a memorial marker to our Stonewall Association founder Delores Taormina in **Wellington Park on Tuesday September 20 at 10 a.m.** She was a principal role player in shaping the development of the R. J.

Reynolds Tobacco property, which stretched along Reynolds Road from Clays Mill Road east to the railroad tracks.

In behalf of the nearby neighborhoods, Delores, Joanne Bell (her neighbor, good friend, and fellow community leader), and Councilperson Jennifer Mossotti fought and won the battle to reduce the intense development proposed and approved for the Reynolds property. Their efforts also won Wellington Park for us.

The recognition on the 20th also will celebrate the successful completion of the Clays Mill Road widening outside New Circle Road and the placement of the Bridge to Nowhere that has set unconnected in Wellington Park for years.

Mayor Jim Gray will be with us, and Councilperson Mossotti will make the presentation. Plan to attend if you can. You will hear some interesting stories and enjoy the speakers' recall of what happened to make our part of Lexington what it is today. Parking is available in the lot off Wellington Way.

MULCH CENTER PROGRESS/TOWNHOUSE DEVELOPMENT

The owners of 1400 Higbee Mill Road, Central Kentucky Mulch Company, requested in July from the Kentucky Division of Water a fill permit to raise the level of land (by adding fill material) between Higbee Mill Road and South Elkhorn Creek near Man-O-War. This fill permit has been granted, and the owners can now proceed specify their exact plan for the fill. Overall, the idea of permitting is to have the owners prove that their plan will not cause increased flooding of neighboring properties.

Mulch operation (continued)

You will recall that in early 2015, the owners proposed to open a retail garden center and mulch operation at 1400, but it was halted by LFUCG because much of the land in 1400 lies in a flood plain. Filling in the flood plain is apparently the owners' method of eliminating that problem so that they may develop the land. If the owners propose again to establish a retail garden center and mulch operation, there will be a public hearing of the Board of Adjustment at which neighbors can comment. Garden center is a conditional use in the AU zoning in which 1400 lies.

We will try to keep you informed as these developments progress.

INDEPENDENCE DAY PARADE

The first-ever prize for an adult costume went to the Taylor family, who dressed as a firecracker and the Statue of Liberty. STONEWALL PARK ACTIVITIES

If you have not yet walked along the creek to the end of the asphalt path, you should. And take your grandchild or your grandparent. You might see some ducks, you might see a squirrel, a rabbit, a groundhog, a spider, a mouse, a skunk, or a crow. If you would like to take your dog for a walk in the woods without the bugs, try the natural pathway along the old roadbed that lies newly mulched about 20 feet up on the hill, above the asphalt pathway. With a little help from a few more volunteers to keep check on the invasives, we could reclaim another 25 yards of tamed territory to the south. to include the bridge. Our butterfly garden is winding down after a pretty good summer, with watering required only twice! Liz Pattengill reports that the yellow tickseed and scented goldenrod have been carrying the bloom with annuals orange zinnia and yellow cosmos. Now it's the turn of blue New England aster, pink Joe Pye weed, and goldenrod "fireworks." As those wonders fade out, watch for the pink muhly grass and salmon-colored Sheffield single chrysanthemums to take over in September until frost. Liz is delighted to report that milkweed is in bloom in the "natural" area farther along the path.
